### Passing of Mrs. Sarah Siens

Sarah Erwin, daughter of Elijah Erwin, was born near Sandusky, Ohio, August 17, 1842. Her girlhood days were spent in that vicinity among the hardy pioneers of the Buckeye State until the year 1860 when on February 12, she was married to Thos. R. Siens, who preceded her in death twenty-one years ago.

The first years of her married life were spent in the vicinity of McArthur, Ohio, where they resided on a farm until 1862, when they decided to seek their fortunes on the boundless prairies of Illinois, which at that time were being rapidly settled up. They arrived in Pontoosuc, Illinois, in a prairie schooner in the fall of 1862 and moved to the Hoopole Tavern vicinity south of Pontoosuc in the spring of '63 where they resided until 1875 when they moved to Pontoosuc, Illinois, where she made her home until 1911 when she moved to Dallas City and she and daughter, Alice, lived at the residence on Third Street until the time of her death, June 13.

Mother Siens was the second daughter of a family of five children, three boys and two girls, all of whom have preceded her to the great beyond.

To her were born six children, Maryann Siens, who died in Ohio; Josephine Siens, who died after their removal to Illinois. Thomas who died in Pontoosuc; and Alice C., Perry, and Hirman Vinton Siens, who remain to mourn her demise. She united with the Christian Church at Bethel, Ohio, in 1856, and transferred her card to the church at Dallas City when it was first organized and was a member of the Congregation that built the present edifice of that denomination in Dallas City and as long her health would permit she never missed a service.

Funeral services were conducted by the undersigned, assisted by Rev. G. H. Marsh at the Christian Church in Dallas City on Thursday June 15, at 10 o'clock. The many floral tributes bespoke the high esteem in which she was held. Interment in Myers cemetery.—NOEL T. ADAMS.
